

## Malawi Animals

Whether looking for a herd of elephant, a pod of hippo, or a troop of monkeys, the visitor will find them in the national parks of Malawi. Herds of cape buffalo, Nile crocodile, bush and water buck live alongside impala, zebra, warthogs, and baboons. Night hunters including panthers, leopards, and lion, with an occasional cheetah, scramble across your path. Exotic birds (Estimated at 600 species) and stunning landscape



help round out the excitement of being in a remote part of the world that is close to what it was like in the distant past. You will want to make reservations ahead for an overnight stay in one of the parks, and plan to take off your watch and put it in your luggage. You will discover an experience like no other, and you will want to come back over and over.

Malawi's 10 national parks started with Nyika National Park in the Northern District in 1965. It remains the largest of the parks. A short distance to the south is Vwaza Marsh Game Reserve, and even closer to the capital is Kasungu National Park, Lake Malawi National Park, and Nkhotakota Game Reserve. The most popular park is Liwonde National Park located in the southeastern part of the nation, along with Majete Wildlife Reserve farther to the South.
