


Medical Glove Shortfall



She stood at the door of the rural clinic. Not far away sat several patients waiting for various forms of medical care. She was neat, trim, medium stature, quite professional, and well dressed for the dusty, worn-down, wind-blown environment in which she had to work.

Collette looked to be in her late 20's or early 30's, and she watched closely as the team from the Malawi Project unloaded the medical supplies being donated to the clinic. When questioned about where she grew up, where she studied medicine, and how she came to be in this remote place Collette answered each question in turn, with the ease of a professional.



Then a question about her future. "I will die soon," she said matter-of-factly. Everyone grew quiet. "Do you have a terminal illness?," she was asked. "Not yet," she responded, then she continued, "but I know the end is near. I work every day delivering babies, bandaging wounds, and cleaning cuts and burns. I never have gloves, so I can be sure that one day I will care for a patient that is HIV/aids positive and I will catch it. Then I will die."

When she was handed a box of 100-pair of life saving, protective gloves Collette cried. Collette is one of thousands of professional health care workers in Malawi who need life-saving gloves to stay healthy and alive.
